Time to settle in and get some work done!

Well guys and gals it's October and the first long haul of the school year is nearly done. The September thru Thanksgiving period is the most significant break free period in the school year. There is another in the Spring, but this one always seemed to weigh on me as the toughest to get through. By the time late November rolls around I'm about ready to jump.

We all have to guard against that time when kids get comfortable and get complacent in class and behaviors creep into the picture that can make our lives very difficult. I've always taken care to vary instructional practices to get out of the early year rut that can result in boredom for the kids and myself included.

Each of us is under pressure to produce improved standardized testing results and demonstrate a year and a half or better of growth in measured categories. It's not just math and english teachers either. Of course our elementary staff are grappling with all subjects, but at the secondary level staff that have never felt they were responsible for these scores are on notice that they are expected to find ways to incorporate skill practice to help facilitate growth. That is a goode thing.

We are all in this work together and need to shoulder whatever portion of the load we can to help our students succeed and thus our district to demonstrate the growth we need to get out from under the yoke of State supervision. It certainly is not a new concept that we are collectively responsible, but I believe we are all much more aware and engaged than ever before at pushing this work forward as a total staff.

This extended period of instruction in the start of the year is the most consequential time for us to establish in the minds of our students that they must work hard to improve and that we are not going to just let them opt out. Keep your instruction fresh. Vary your approach to classroom routines to keep from getting stale. Continue to engage your students with your personality and let them know you care. Diversify your curriculum as best you can to meet your students where they are and push them to get them to go where you need them to be.

We have an outstanding staff of educators in this union. We have a remarkable challenge in front of us. We are in the most critical stage of getting this work done. Lean on one another to stay sane. Keep your mental and emotional well-being protected as you are tested by the fatigue of the long stretch in the weeks to come. You can make it to the break periods and your students will perform if you continue to show them the way.

We can do this job!

State budget passes with increases to School funding

So, the state has officially passed its budget.

The school budget increased by 2.5% over last year. The foundation allowance increased by 4.6% to %10,050 per student. That is a \$442 increase.

House Republicans had proposed the consolidation of categorical funding which would have potentially put specialized funding at risk as it would give districts more freedom to use money where they wanted instead of earmarking it for special populations. At risk funding increased by a whopping 25% and other educator friendly programs were funded to assist in smaller class sizes and mental and emotional well-being.

There is a small amount set aside for educator bonuses. The amount we will receive is not much, but we will negotiate to find the best way to apply it to our staff. When details are available, ytu will be informed of what we will do.

Importantly, School meals are funded and the MPSERS reimbursements for retiree health care were funded which allows the cessation of collecting 3% from much of the staff for this purpose.

There were some financial diversions to privates schools for food, and virtual schools. The continued pattern of inclusion of Higher ed in the school aid budget is an important trend to keep track of to be certain that both levels are properly funded in the future. For example, those programs were not increased to the same level as the k-12 budget. There is a developing competition in funding between the two levels within the same budget.

Final Contract publication

We expect that the final version of the contract will be made available by the end of the week. Once the final format is approved it will be published on the district website transparency report and the union website.

Union Website still under construction

We have been working for some time to iron out issues with accessibility to the union website in order to update the information on it and increase its user friendliness.

Matt Vandenbrook has been tasked to solve the multitude of problems we have been faced with over teh past years that just made its accessibility difficult. We believe we have solved those problems and Matt promises that the work will be completed soon. We look forward to being able to push information out to you on a regular schedule using that platform as a primary communication option.

To say the weekend was enlightening is an understatement! I was able to hear from leaders of local organizations such as Mothering Justice, 482Forward, and the Ruth Ellis Center. As well as leaders of national organizations such as Transformative Justice Coalition, Race Forward, and United we Dream.

Along with morning and afternoon plenary sessions, I signed up for AFT MOVE training. MOVE stands for Mobilize, Organize, Vote, Empower. In this three part training series, participants were equipped with hands-on experience needed to defend democracy and civil rights. We learned how to design and execute campaigns that use direct action, non-cooperation and mutual aid to protect communities, build solidarity and challenge authoritarian systems. Through practical exercises (such as protest role plays, hassle lines, and role play affinity groups) we practiced mobilizing volunteers, organizing actions and empowering others to take meaningful steps in resisting attacks on our rights.

This conference was not about reflection- it was about action, and preparing ourselves for the road to 2026 and beyond. The future of democracy will not be defended by a few; it will be won by all of us, together!


